Spotlight: Traci Johnson Accepts a New Assignment in Todd County, KY

By this time, many readers have probably heard that Oldham County Agriculture Agent Traci Johnson will



soon depart for a new position in Todd County. All are invited to attend an open house and reception for Traci on Tuesday, December 12, 2023, 4:00 PM – 6:00 PM at Oldham County Extension, 205 Parker Drive in LaGrange (if you have questions, call 502-222-9453).

On a quiet Friday afternoon in November, Traci Johnson talked with us about opportunities that drew her to Todd County and will allow her to build on Oldham County experiences.

Traci looks forward to moving closer to her extended family in west Kentucky, including an area where tobacco is still grown. Some readers may recall how families and their neighbors came together to harvest tobacco and prepare it for market.

She explains, "Even though tobacco is hard work, it is a very interesting crop from an agronomic standpoint, and the camaraderie working in it seems unique to the crop. I still remember the coal stove in my grandparents stripping room, pulling leaves, and all the story-telling that went along with it."

Traci anticipates reconnecting with those tobacco roots as well as serving other ag enterprises. Todd County is a top vegetable producing county in Kentucky, and many growers participate in the nearby <u>Fairview Produce Auction</u>.

Todd County is also a big grain-producing county. Over her years in Oldham County, Traci has worked with farmers to conduct field research covering a variety of crop pests. She is excited to continue serving grain crop farmers, especially through field research.

"I really am a research geek at heart," says Traci.

Of her 19 years in Oldham County, Traci says, "I've learned a whole lot here. Horses are the number one ag enterprise in Oldham County. When I first arrived I only had experience with quarter horses. Fortunately, all horses have common needs and challenges when it comes to pasture and manure management."

Traci is especially proud of working with Oldham County cattle farmers to start the Oldham County Cattlemen's Association, now a thriving organization. When she came to the county, she looked around and saw that Henry, Trimble, and Shelby all had Cattlemen's Associations but not Oldham.


One day, Tee Ray, owner of TNT Farms, came into the office and asked, "Why don't we have a Cattlemen's Association?"

That was all the prompting Traci needed to support starting the organization. This fall the Oldham County Cattlemen's Association celebrates their 15th anniversary.

Earlier this week, a farmer visiting the Oldham County Conservation District offices described Traci's approach to serving as a technical advisor in glowing terms, adding, "If she doesn't know the answer, she'll find it for you." Welcome, Logan Duke, District Conservationist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service!

Logan Duke has been employed with the USDA – Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) for five years and recently accepted a new assignment as the District Conservationist serving Henry, Oldham, and Trimble Counties.

Originally from Frankfort, KY, Logan grew up working in tobacco on his family's farm in Owen County. He later was involved in vegetable production and sales at local farmers' markets. 
